

The ONE Archives Foundation Welcomes our Youth Ambassadors for Queer History Intern


We are thrilled to announce the ONE Archives Foundation's newest intern: Mel Mateo Barrios! Read below to learn more about them:

ONE Archives at the USC Libraries receives the Simeon Wade Papers

ONE Archives at USC Libraries is pleased to announce the recent acquisition of the papers of Simeon Wade. Wade's friendship with Michel Foucault, a 1975 LSD trip in California's Death Valley, and a decades-long unpublished book manuscript (forthcoming as Foucault in California, March 2019, Heyday Books) have drawn notice in a number of philosophical, theoretical and literary circles. Wade is a significant figure in the history of Southern California and has been chronicled in James Miller's Foucault biography.

A contemporary of Kevin Starr during his Harvard doctoral studies, Wade moved to California and taught at Claremont Graduate School, although he never received tenure, which may, it has been conjectured, been the result of his openly gay lifestyle. After teaching in several other Southern California institutions and living out his final years in Oxnard working as a psychiatric nurse, Wade's reflections on his time with Foucault in 1975 came to light in an interview with Heather Dundas: "Michel Foucault in Death Valley: A Boom interview with Simeon Wade," published in UC Press's Boom California, Sept 10, 2017. Shortly after, Wade died of natural causes on October 3, 2017.

After Wade's death it was determined that ONE Archives would be the best home for the collection. As the largest LGBTQ archive in the world, having a home at ONE means Wade's personal papers, letters, images, and courses will now be available for students, scholars, and future researchers, and those studying late 20th c. philosophy, Foucault studies, Southern California cultural history, the history of higher education, American intellectual history, and the history of sexuality. Along with images of Foucault, the collection includes unpublished letters of correspondence between Simeon Wade and Foucault. ONE wishes to offer thanks to the efforts of Patricia Prestinary of Cal State Fullerton's Special Collections, Jason Sexton, and Simeon's surviving brother David and his wife Nancy, for the generosity of their efforts in shepherding the collection's donation to ONE Archive at USC Libraries.
